Thank you for your letter of 20th January concerning T. H. Price, M.R.C.S.  
1869, L.K.Q.C.P. & L.M. 1869.

He was educated at the Ledwich School (Later incorporated into the school of medicine of the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland) and Mercer's Hospital, Dublin. As you know, he obtained the M.R.C.S. England in 1869 and in the same year obtained the Licentiate of the King and Queen's College of Physicians of Ireland and the Licence in Midwifery. At that time his address was given as Bangor. He practised at 4, High Street, Thomas Street, Manchester and at 39 Great Ancoats Street, Manchester. He was a member of the B.M.A. During his career he had been Medical Officer to the Manchester Workhouse, Surgeon to the Liverpool Dispensaries, Medical Officer of the Cathedral District of the Manchester (Poor Law) Union, Public Vaccinator to the First and Second Districts of the Manchester Union, and Medical Officer to the Oddfellows, Manchester Church of England, and other friendly societies. His name is listed in the Obituary section of the Medical Directory of 1896 among those who died between December 1894 and December 1895, but without a specific date, and without his age at death. Neither the Lancet nor the British Medical Association published an obituary notice.

The King and Queen's College of Physicians was the title by which the present Royal College of Physicians of Ireland was known between 1692 and 1889. Its Licentiate was a qualifying diploma, as is the Licentiate of the Royal College of Physicians of London, and became one of the registrable qualifications after the passing of the Act of 1858, and became part of the Irish Board's qualifying diploma in 1886. The College, like all the other Royal Colleges except the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland, was an examining body. The R.C.S.I. is the only Royal College to have maintained (and continues to do so to-day) an undergraduate medical school.

I hope this answer gives you some help, though I can find no personal details, not even what the H. in his name stands for.
